The WA Syphilis Outbreak Response Group (WA SORG)

The WA SORG is responsible for coordinating a statewide response to the increasing notifications of infectious syphilis that are being experienced in WA. The WA SORG reports to the WA Chief Health Officer, with regular briefings provided to the national Multijurisdictional Syphilis Outbreak Working Group, and the national Enhanced Response Addressing Sexually Transmissible Infections (and Blood Borne Viruses) in Indigenous Populations Governance Group (the Governance Group). The WA SORG encompasses the Kimberley, Pilbara, Goldfields, South West and Perth Metropolitan regions.

This communique provides a quarterly update of the WA syphilis outbreak response; the previous Communique (no. 8) was made available in March 2021.

Current status




Figure 1. Epidemic curve showing the number of infectious syphilis notifications among Aboriginal people living in regions affected by the ongoing outbreak in Aboriginal communities, i.e. the Kimberley, Pilbara and Goldfields, from 1 January 2011 to 31 March 2021.

The outbreak data in people living in regions affected by the ongoing outbreak in Aboriginal communities; i.e. the Kimberley, Pilbara and Goldfields regions to 31 March 2021 are shown in Figure 1 and Table 1.




Figure 2. Epidemic curve showing the number of infectious syphilis notifications among Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal people in the Perth metropolitan and South West regions of WA, from 1 January 2011 to 31 March 2021.

The Chief Health Officer authorised a state-wide public health response to infectious syphilis in identified at-risk populations after increased cases emerged in the Perth metropolitan area and South West region. The data for these two areas is shown in Figure 2 and Table 2.

Governance Update

WA SORG

- The WA SORG meets on a quarterly basis and the last meeting was on 10 June 2021.
- The WA Syphilis Outbreak Response <u>site</u> is updated regularly with relevant guidelines, trainings and resources.
- The WA Syphilis Outbreak Response Action Plan Annual Report 2019-20 has been completed and includes a progress report against the Monitoring Framework. The report is available on the WA Syphilis Outbreak Response <u>site</u>.
- The membership in the Terms of Reference has been reviewed and now includes representatives from all seven WA Country Health Service regions as well as the Perth metropolitan area.
- The WA Syphilis Outbreak Response Action Plan is being reviewed and updated.

 Table 3. WA Syphilis Outbreak Response Action Plan key priority area activity updates.

Priority Area 1: Prevention, education and community engagement

- The WA Department of Health has recently launched the HealthySexual <u>campaign</u> and a new <u>website</u>.
- A database of community educational syphilis and STI resources is being developed by the Prevention, Education and Community Engagement working group.
- The Kimberley PHU has developed and implemented a social influencers pilot program to promote syphilis education and testing through social media.
- Education and community engagement activities were rolled-out as part of WA Sexual Health Week.

• The South West PHU are developing pregnancy and syphilis resources.

Priority Area 2: Workforce development

- The syphilis videoconference (VC) series is ongoing. Recent sessions have included syphilis and at-risk populations, and congenital syphilis.
- A Midwives-specific syphilis online learning webinar is being delivered by ASHM on 21 July 2021.
- The WA Department of Health has funded 13 organisations through grants to increase workforce capacity to respond to infectious syphilis.
- WA Country Health Service are providing funding for 10.2 FTE for staffing in outbreak regions
- A significant amount of training has been provided to staff in all regions including hospital staff, midwives, primary healthcare providers and community health workers.
- Birds and the BBVs was delivered by the Aboriginal Health Council WA in the Goldfields and the Kimberley regions. 17 participants attended the training in the Goldfields and 14 attended in the Kimberley.
- WACHS regional teams continue to conduct sexual health orientation with new staff.
- Nuts and Bolts training was delivered in the Pilbara.

Priority Area 3: Testing, treatment and contact tracing

- All 24 placements within the syphilis point-of-care testing program have been allocated. From July 1 2020 to 10 June 2021 there have been 198 healthcare workers trained in syphilis PoCT and 7,300 testing strips have been disseminated to services.
- Testing guidelines have been updated on the Silver book. Custodians of national and other state guidelines have been written to requesting alignment of testing guidelines.
- STI testing quick guide and syphilis quick guide have been updated to reflect updated testing guidelines for infectious syphilis in pregnant women.
- The Test More campaign targeting clinicians to promote increase in STI testing rates across the Kimberley continues.
- The Pilbara PHU are implementing the EASY project to increase testing rates in Emergency Departments.

• The Goldfields PHU have developed a Step by Step Syphilis Guide for the public health team.

Priority Area 4: Surveillance and reporting

• The Kimberley Population Health Unit is developing automated reporting systems for MJSO targets.

Priority Area 5: Antenatal and postnatal care

- Congenital syphilis investigations are underway.
- The baby baskets program is ongoing in the Goldfields and Pilbara regions.
- The WA Department of Health is developing an antenatal syphilis campaign in partnership with the Aboriginal Health Council of WA and regional/remote services.
- The South West PHU has development a 'Stamp' to be used by General Practice Obstetricians (GPO's) when ordering serology on antenatal patients to increase access to results.
